HHS expands eligibility for general distribution funds

HHS has clarified that those who bill Medicare, Medicaid, Medicaid Managed Care or CHIP, or are a dental provider, are eligible to apply for general distribution funding if they have not already received 2% of their patient revenue from the fund. First-time or previous applicants also may apply if they haven't already received 2% of their patient revenue.

This includes Medicare Part A providers who experienced a change in ownership and billed Medicare fee-for-service in 2019 or 2020 and had previously been ineligible to apply.

The deadline for applying for this general distribution funding is **Friday**, **Aug. 28**.

Appropriate-use criteria program testing extended

The educational and operations testing period for the appropriate-use criteria program has been extended through calendar year 2021. There are no payment consequences associated with the program during calendar years 2020 and 2021. Stakeholders are encouraged to use this period to learn, test and prepare for the appropriate-use criteria program.

HHS releases COVID-19 testing plans from states

The Department of Health and Human Services has posted COVID-19 testing plans for state, local and territorial jurisdictions through the rest of calendar year 2020. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in May distributed \$10.25 billion from the Paycheck Protection Program and Health Care Enhancement Act to state, territorial and local jurisdictions for COVID-19 testing, surveillance, contact tracing and related activities. The recipients were required to submit a plan for using the funds, including their strategy and goals for diagnostic and serology tests for the rest of this year.

Health equity during COVID-19 and disproportionate outcomes for marginalized groups

The National Academy of Medicine's Culture of Health Program is committed to advancing the scientific underpinnings for progress in health equity and sharing evidence-based strategies. The intent is to dismantle structural racism and ultimately achieve health equity for all, mitigating the effects of the crisis and safeguarding the nation's well-being. The program has compiled a list of resources on health equity in the context of COVID-19. These resources will be updated regularly.

New Dimensions dashboards released

IHA has published two new dashboards to Dimensions Discovery Datalytics: Medicare COVID-19 High Risk and Medicare COVID-19 High Risk County. These dashboards use the new Medicare Part B dataset and show where different high-risk patients are going for care and how lowa counties compare in terms of the percentage of visits classified as "high risk."
